


## NEW HAMPSHIRE VOTERS WANT MORE AFFORDABLE HOUSING



\*NH voters think housing is the most important issue facing the state.

\*Not a single voter polled under age 35 disagreed with the need for more affordable housing in their community.

\*78% of NH voters think that their community needs more affordable housing.

\*A majority of NH voters want to see affordable rental options in all communities, including suburbs and rural towns. 64% of respondents disagree with the statement "Our suburbs and rural towns should have mostly just single-family homes. Apartments, duplexes, and townhouses should be built only in cities."

\*A significant increase in NH voters support local land-use regulation reform to allow for more housing. Net agreement went from +12 in 2022 to +26 in 2023 (60% agreeing, 34% disagreeing) to the statement: "New Hampshire towns and cities should change their planning and zoning regulations in order to allow more housing to be built."

\*Polling shows a decline in NIMBY sentiment. Net agreement with the statement, "My neighborhood needs more affordable housing to be built" grew from +7 in 2022 to +21 in 2023 (58% agreeing, 37% disagreeing).
